Reading and Resources List

This Reading and Resources List is in four parts. The first section lists the four required books for the course, which you should buy online (for example, Amazon). The second section lists the six case studies, which you should be via the Harvard Business Press online. The third and fourth sections contain links to free websites to support your reading and research.

A. Books

There are four required books for the class, each is available online (Amazon, Overstock) for about \$15 or less new, or as little as \$5-6 each, used (a total of up to \$60). Be sure to purchase the paperback editions!

1. The Bottom Billion: Why the Poorest Countries Are Failing and What Can Be Done About It (Collier, 2007)
2. Portfolios of the Poor: How the World's Poor Live on \$2 a Day (Collins, 2009)
3. Banker to the Poor: Micro-Lending and the Battle Against World Poverty (Yunus, 1999; paperback ed. 2003)
4. The Microfinance Handbook: An Institutional and Financial Perspective (The World Bank); only one copy per project group is needed

Look to the “Class Schedule” to determine when to read these books, or the chapters you may select to focus your reading effort.

Also posted on Blackboard is a recommended reading list for social enterprise, which includes other books that address microfinance and global poverty (no additional books are required).
