

#### Jim Fraser Joins the Center

It is our privilege to inform you that former Dean of the School of Education at Northeastern, James Fraser, has come on board with our Center as Senior Research Fellow to join current senior fellow, Rick Porter. As many at Northeastern know, Jim served as the founding dean

of our School of Education from 1999 to 2004 and before that as Director of the Center for Innovation in Urban Education. Jim holds a joint appointment in the School of Education and the Department of History. He is returning from a sabbatical leave in which he has completed the manuscript for a new book, Preparing the American Teacher: A History, which will be forthcoming from Teachers College Press next spring. In his new role, Jim will be looking to identify the means to link the range of experiential educational opportunities offered by Northeastern to classroom learning as well as to identify opportunities for both concurrent reflection while students are on co-op and ways in which the post-co-op curriculum can offer students continuing reflection.

#### Third International Conference on Practice-Oriented Education held this past summer

The Center co-sponsored the 2005 POE Conference held in conjunction with the World Association of Cooperative Education (WACE) 14<sup>th</sup> World Congress. A full line-up of sessions were presented during an exciting three days of dialogue. #### "Guided Peer Mentoring" Pilot

The Center's guided peer mentoring pilot has been launched through the cooperation of the Master's Program in College Student Development and Counseling, which is under the supervision of Cohort II POE Fellow, Dr. Vanessa Johnson. Four learning teams of students have been formed. Team members meet once a month to share their on-the-job learning while on their co-op assignments. The face-to-face meetings are supplemented with online discussions using Blackboard. Each learning team is assisted by a trained facilitator pursuing her degree in the counseling program. The facilitators for this first pilot are: Linda Bonda, Linda Collins, Ilana Weisbrod, and Stacy-Ann Wint.

#### Martha's Vineyard Summer Institute on Experiential Education

The Center for Experiential Education & Academic Advising (CEA), within the College of Arts and Sciences at Northeastern University, hosted the [Martha's Vineyard Summer Institute on Experiential Education](#) in July. The goal was to help campuses develop strategies that strengthen their efforts to promote learning outside and inside the traditional classroom through a range of activities. Eleven colleges sent representative teams for this first institute. Each developed plans for experiential service offerings in the areas of: cooperative education, service-learning, undergraduate research, community-based research, study abroad, and academic internships.

Action learning is grounded in the approach pioneered by Reg Revans that holds that there can be no learning without action and no knowing without the effort to practice and implement what is claimed as knowledge. Because action learning promotes the creative

integration of thinking & doing, theory & practice, contributors are asked to strive to hold these often diverse perspectives together.
