## Horizons for Homeless Children's Playspace Programs

*Commonwealth Corps Member (3 Full Time Opportunities Available)*

Horizons for Homeless Children is an independent, non-profit organization exclusively dedicated to providing early care and education services for homeless children and support services for their families in an atmosphere of safety, nurturance, and stability. The Horizons for Homeless Children Playspace Programs provide playrooms for children living in area shelters and then recruit and train volunteers to play with the children in those Playspaces.

The mission of the Commonwealth Corps is to engage Massachusetts residents of all ages and backgrounds in direct service to rebuild communities, address unmet community needs, and increase volunteerism. More than 250 Commonwealth Corps members will serve up to twelve months in full-time or part-time capacities at 36 designated nonprofits and public entities. What they have in common is a desire to put their talents and ideas to use in the service of their communities and the Commonwealth.

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## *Assignment Overview:*

The Commonwealth Corps member is responsible for assisting with recruitment, training and retention of volunteers. The Corps member assists with the maintenance and restocking of Playspaces where volunteers work with the shelter liaisons to assure that the Playspaces are well stocked and maintained. This opportunity is full time and it requires a commitment of 1600 hours over a 12 month period, with a stipend of \$10,000 plus a completion bonus. The assignment runs from September 1, 2009 through August 31, 2010.

## *Duties and Responsibilities Include:*

### Outreach:

- Assist with the recruitment of volunteers for the Region's Playspace Programs through outreach activities, visibility events, community outreach, mailings and distributing flyers, media venues, and volunteer fairs
- Respond to prospective volunteer inquiries in a timely manner
- Support maintenance of database for all outreach contacts, media and volunteers
- Assist with PAL trainings (registration, materials and training packets)
- Assist with volunteer events, activities and workshops

### Playspaces Programs:

- Assist with the installation and opening of new Playspaces and refurbishment of existing Playspaces
- Assist in the sorting, selecting and management of in-kind donations to be used in the Playspaces
- Assist in the maintenance, inventory and restocking of Playspace Programs storerooms
- Assist in strengthening relationships with PALs through regular communication and appreciation efforts to help foster volunteer retention
- Administrative and other tasks as necessary

- Stipend for full time member of full year service: \$10,000, equivalent to \$384.61 bi-weekly
- Completion bonus
- Health care benefit

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## **Tutor a hotel Worker**

Our mission at Boston Education and Skills Training (BEST Corp) is to provide our clients with the necessary skills and training to excel in the hospitality field and in their personal lives. All of our clients are employed in local hotels and are enrolled in our classes in order to improve their skills with the goal of job advancement. In addition to the hotel skills-oriented classes such as various levels of culinary and housekeeping, our students attend regularly scheduled English classes.

One of the greatest pleasures and rewards derived from tutoring is an opportunity to learn as well as to teach. Many of our students want and need extra help with their English. We ask our tutors to meet with a student once per week for 1.5 hours for a period of 6 months.

**The days and times for tutoring are flexible** and are arranged by the tutor and the tutee depending on each one's availability. The location for the tutoring is also decided by the tutor and tutee. Appropriate materials are available for a tutor to use and suggestions for materials will be made by a staff member who is familiar with the language needs of the particular student. We also have a computer lab where, if they wish, a tutor and a tutee can work on any number of language learning programs and activities. A two evening, 5 hr. tutor training is provided and on-going help is always available.

A tutor should have an interest in working with people from other cultures, have a good grasp of basic English grammar, and be able to commit to a six month time frame (with flexibility, of course). Being patient is very important and a good sense of humor goes a long way. Our staff is friendly and helpful and is committed to the success of both our students and our volunteers. We would welcome your participation in our volunteer tutoring program.
